

FIRST THINGS FIRST

USE REPLICA OR RUBBER PROP GUNS WHENEVER POSSIBLE.

- NO PERSON IS TO BE COAXED, COERCED, OR OTHERWISE FORCED INTO HANDLING A FIREARM.
- STRICT PROHIBITION ON HANDLING WEAPONS WHILE UNDER THE INFLUENCE OF ALCOHOL, ADDICTIVE SUBSTANCES OR DRUGS AFFECTING ATTENTION
- ALL LOCAL, STATE AND FEDERAL LAWS AND REGULATIONS ARE APPLICABLE AND CAN OVERRIDE THESE GUIDELINES IF THEY ARE MORE STRINGENT.

MAIN CHALLENGES

- The use of firearms on set can result in serious injuries (potentially lethal) if the necessary safety precautions are not followed.
- Firearms tend to be heavily regulated by local and international law, which is subject to change.
- Public could mistake the shots on set for a real crime and alarm authorities or intervene themselves.

- Firearm laws can differ greatly from country to country. A gun type can be used with no restriction in one state while being subject to strict regulation in the other.
- Blanks are extremely dangerous. Even though they do not fire bullets out of the gun barrel, they still have a powerful blast that can maim or kill.
- Once the trigger is pulled there is nothing one can do to revert the outcome.

MAIN HEALTH & SAFETY RESPONSIBILITIES



- THE PRODUCTION has the responsibility to provide a safe work environment, regardless of the industry standards.



- All firearms are the responsibility of ARMOURER, who shall oversee their safe use.



- The primary responsibility for safety falls on the HEADS OF THE DEPARTMENT (HoD), who must provide a healthy and safe working environment for their co-workers, sub-contractors and their employees, as well as visitors.




MAIN TASKS AND RESPONSIBILITIES





1st AD

STUNT COORDINATOR



may include combat drills, tactical movements with the gun





ARMOURER

HOLDS CURRENT APPROPRIATE LICENCES

for all firearms and weapons prior their use on set

ENSURE ALL WEAPONS HAVE THE NECESSARY VALID REVISION AND CERTIFICATES

- the ammunition was manufactured and certified for the purpose
- **POLICE / AUTHORITIES NOTIFICATION**

HELPS TO CHOOSE SUITABLE WEAPONS

ADVISES ON THE USE OF WEAPONS

• checks if the police/authorities were notified of the use of firearms





DIRECTOR

CREATES A RISK ASSESSMENT

for the action/movie

for each day of filming, where weapons will be used

RESPONSIBLE FOR NOT ALLOWING LIVE AMMUNITION ON SET

DETERMINES SAFETY DISTANCES

in cooperation with the Stunt Coordinator

SUPERVISES THE SUPPLY, TRANSPORT, STORAGE

• of weapons on set

INSTRUCTS CREW AND CAST

 in the safe handling and safety procedures for all the weapons to be used. An attendance list must be signed by all people present

WILL ASSESS USERS

 and will remove weapons from incompetent persons if needed

SUPERVISES SAFE USE AND HANDLING OF WEAPONS

• loads and unload the weapons before and after use

ENSURES THAT WEAPONS ARE EMPTY

 every time weapons are being transferred from hand to hand

CLEARS MALFUNCTIONING WEAPON

- in case a weapon jams, Armourer is the only one to fix it
- ensures weapon is safe and ready to operate


















OTHER SPECIALISTS ON SET

- To re-create a realistic shooting scenes several specialists must work closely together to achieve the desired effect.
- SFX Specialists will create the effect the ammo would have on it's target.
- There usually is a different Armourer specialising on cold weapons and their use.
- Art Department works closely with the armourer to dress the weapon for set.



STUNT COORDINATOR

 designs and oversees the fight choreography



SFX SPECIALIST

creates body hits, blood splashes







ARMOURER

 responsible for all firearms



AMBULANCE

 always on set when firearms are used

COLD WEAPON SPECIALIST

 advises on the use of cold weapons

ART DEPARTMENT

• takes care about the holsters, scabbards etc.







LEGAL

FIREARMS IN CZECH REPUBLIC



PERMITS AND AUTHORISATIONS

• based on the firearm category a person needs to hold a firearm pass, firearm licence plus a special exceptions or authorisation

ARMOURER QUALIFICATION

- there is no special Armourer qualification required by the law apart from having a firearm pass
- however we would recommend a firearms instructor license as a minimum to ensure the necessary knowledge and experience

FIREARMS CLASSIFICATION

 blank-firing/gas operating guns can be classified as class D (only age restriction) but also as class A-I (restricted, special exceptions needed) depending on whether they were built in line with a special regulations

NOTIFYING REQUIREMENTS

- police needs to be notified in advance about any weapons being discharged. This is to be done in writing
- also the property/premisses owner needs to be made aware of the planned use of firearms

SET SAFETY

 it is a good practice to put up signs in front of the set to notify the public about ongoing filming and possible shots they may hear being fake and not a crime

NO LIVE AMMUNITION ON SET

- no live ammunition should be brought to set
- live ammunition should not be used under circumstances where a desired special effect can be achieved by using conventional special effects techniques
- live ammo can only be discharged at a site suitable for this use (i.e., a military, police, or private gun range)

NO OWN WEAPONS ON SET

- in Czech republic people can legally own and carry firearm
- crew needs to be made aware that no private weapons or ammunition are permitted on set



CHILD ACTORS

CHILDREN ON SET

- children should not be on set where weapons are fired
- only rubber prop guns to be given to child actors
